Vocabulary Book

Introduction

Traditional vocabulary books involve lists of new words and translations.
They encourage you to do a lot of memory tests.
They don't encourage you to use your new words.

“Word Surfing” notebooks involve a vocabulary development strategy.
They encourage you to

- *choose the best way to get to know each of your new words.*
- *use your new words as soon as possible.*
- *check your real long-term progress **and***
- ***“learn by doing”.***

The step-by-step explanations of the method that follow will show you how to organise new words and phrases in your book.

Method

Steps 1 & 2 are taken together at the beginning for each new word.

Step 1 – Enter “new words” (as shown in Example 1 on the next page)

- *New words or phrases that you want to get to know are entered in the left-hand column.*
- *Words that you can immediately start to use are entered at the top of the column.*
- *Words that you can only remember by translation are entered at the bottom of the column.*

Step 2 – Enter “connecting words 1” (also shown in Example 1 on page iii)

- *A “connecting word” is any word that you already know that helps you to learn a “new word”.*
- *Always try to start learning your “new words” together with “connecting words”* *For example*

<i>New Words</i>	<i>Connecting Words 1</i>	<i>Connecting Words 2</i>
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<i>chair</i>	<i>sit</i>	
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- *Only enter one idea (one or more words) in the “connecting words 1” column during Step 2.*
- *If you cannot think of a “connecting word” at this stage then enter your “new word” in a space at the bottom of the page – together with its translation in the “connecting words 1” column.*

Steps 3 & 4 are taken after a vocabulary section is full of “new words” & “connecting words 1”

Step 3 – “connecting words 2” (as shown in Example 2 on page iv)

- *Try to enter a “connecting word 2” in the right hand column on each of the 4 pages in the section.*
For example:

<i>New Words</i>	<i>Connecting Words 1</i>	<i>Connecting Words 2</i>
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<i>chair</i>	<i>sit</i>	<i>table (or wood etc)</i>
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Step 4 – “example sentences” (as shown below)

- *Always enter an “example sentence” when you need to start learning “new words” by translation.*
- *Always enter an “example sentence” when you cannot enter a “connecting word 2”.*
- *Choose to write an “example sentence” for any other words that you want to practise.*
- *Always use a good dictionary to find your “example sentence”.*

- The “new words” entered above are all have natural associations with lots of other words that may already be known.(connecting words)
- Starting to learn such “new words” in this manner will give you a lot of good natural practice and help you to avoid the use of translations.
- As your level improves you will be able to find “connecting words” for more and more of your “new words”.
- It is possible to enter more than one word in the “connecting words 1” column – but it should only be one idea. e.g.

“new word”
wheel

connecting words 1
bicycle – two

- It is much more difficult to find natural “new words”for the words entered below – and it may be easier for you to start learning them together with translations.
- You should always enter words needing translations at the bottom of the page.

Words Above

- You may already know several possible “connecting words” for all of them.
- You may be able to use them immediately – and get to know them naturally through valuable practice with Step 1, Step 2 & Step3.
- It may not be necessary to copy example sentences from a dictionary for the “new words” above - but you may want to do so in order to get some more valuable practice.

Words Below

- When you begin to start learning a word by translation it will not be necessary to write in the “connecting words 2” column.
- You should always enter an “example sentence” for these words.(Step 4)

Testing

Step 5. – “Testing”

- *There are regular tests to check your knowledge of vocabulary from previous sections.*
- *When taking these tests , simply cover the “connecting words” columns – and check your ability to **use** your new words.*
- *Any words that you cannot **use** should be entered again in the next section as “new words”.*
- *Remember “If you don’t use them, you’ll lose them”*

Vocabulary Development

How can you really improve your language skills?

By increasing the number of words that you can use correctly and fluently in different ways.

*Expanding your vocabulary is, without doubt, a vital part of learning a new language.
The vocabulary pages that follow will help you to*

- *increase your vocabulary level quickly using an efficient strategy.*
- *start to think more and more in your new language.*
- *get a lot of valuable practice actually using your new vocabulary as soon as possible.*
- *avoid using translations as much as possible.*
- *check your increasing knowledge in a meaningful manner.*
- *identify those words that need more practice in order to be fully known.*

*In short, the vocabulary development strategy you are about to use is all about “**learning by doing**”.*
