An Introduction to the "Word Surfing" Vocabulary Development Strategy

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The following notes compare "traditional" vocabulary notebooks with "Word Surfing" organized vocabulary notebooks. They suggest that language learners would benefit from knowing how to record new words and phrases in a more efficient, practical and motivating manner.

3. Practice	3. Practice

Note : This method doesn't involve any real practice.	Note: This method involves real language practice.

4. Testing

The learner is encouraged to

• test the short-term memory of translations

Note: The ability to use the new language isn't tested

4. Testing

The learner is encouraged to

- test the long-term ability to use new words
- identify those new words that require further practice.
- use "Word Surfing" tests which are available at <u>http://www.wordsurfing.co.uk/WordsurfingTests.pdf</u> as a further indication of progress

Note: The ability to use the new language is tested

5. Motivation

This vocabulary learning method enables the learner to experience

- short-term successes in a series of memory tests
- · no real practice

Note: This method doesn't appear to be particularly motivating or successful except perhaps at the very earliest stage of the learning curve. Experience shows that most learners find the method becomes less interesting, less successful and less relevant as their language level increases. Learners want to be able to use their new words.

5. Motivation

This vocabulary development strategy enables the learner to experience

- long-term progress in language level
- real practice

Note: This strategy accepts the early advantages offered by learning by translation – but encourages learning by doing at the earliest possible stage. The learner is able to gain both practical and important motivational benefits during the vocabulary development process. Both confidence and fluency will tend to increase as the learner becomes more and more capable of "learning by doing" over time.

6. Summary

Word Surfing Vocabulary Notebooks were developed for the following basic reasons

- Vocabulary development is a vital part of the language learning process
- Traditional Vocabulary Notebooks have various practical and motivational weaknesses
- No improvement on Traditional Vocabulary Books seemed to be available to learners

The "Word Surfing" Vocabulary Development Strategy was designed to

- provide a more practical and motivating method of vocabulary improvement
- encourage an emphasis on learning by doing
- provide regular testing
- give a long-term overview of real progress
